Migration Profiles: Developing evidence-based Migration and Development policies

Background

The international workshop on "Migration Profiles: Developing evidence-based Migration and Development policies", is one of the thematic workshops to be carried out within the framework of The Global Forum on Migration and Development (GFMD) 2011, chaired by the Swiss Government. GFMD 5 will provide space for a series of smaller, focused and action-oriented meetings around the world, in support of the Chair's flagship theme 'Taking action on Migration and Development – Coherence, Capacity and Cooperation'. Cluster III of the GFMD Thematic Work Programme, focuses on processes and tools, which can promote an evidence-based approach to policy-making.

The Migration Profile concept, which was first proposed by the European Commission in 2005, has evolved in recent years into a process and tool to promote policy coherence on migration and development, and an evidence-based approach to policy-making, involving a broad range of stakeholders. Governments are increasingly recognizing Migration Profiles as a key tool for such policies, as recommended at the 2010 GFMD Puerto Vallarta and earlier discussions, inter alia in the context of the GFMD Working Group (WG) June 2010 seminar held with governments and other actors in Vienna. Further, the GFMD WG on Policy Coherence, Data and Research has also been consistently supporting the conceptual development and implementation of migration profiles.

Migration Profiles provide a framework for aggregating in a structured and systematic manner existing data and information from international, national and regional sources. To date, more than 70 migration profiles have been prepared, but there is a lack of a common understanding of what a migration profile exercise entails, and how preparing a migration profile can contribute to capacity-building and greater policy coherence.

The overall objective of this seminar is to highlight the importance of data and research for evidence-based policy making and present Migration Profiles as a capacity building tool for strategic policy planning. The New York workshop will provide an opportunity for policy-makers from different regions in the world to raise awareness, develop in-depth knowledge and suggest improvements with regard to Migration Profiles. Countries which have already conducted a Migration Profile exercise will share their experiences with those countries interested in preparing one.











The workshop will focus on a number of key issues such as:

- 1. Are Migration Profiles useful?
- 2. What kind of information should be included in a Migration Profile?
- 3. What is the process required to prepare a Migration Profile? Who should participate in a Migration Profile exercise?
- 4. To what extent can Migration Profiles contribute to policy development and greater policy coherence, and enhance the evidence base including capacity building on migration and development?
- 5. How can Migration Profiles become a tool that is owned by implementing governments and other stakeholders and regularly updated by them?
- 6. What areas and key issues may be included to further develop the MP framework and what opportunities international cooperation offers to the MP initiative?
- 7. To what extent could Migration Profiles be used to assess the impact of migration on development, and thus help to mainstream migration into national development plans?

Outcome

In addition to a report of the discussions, a compilation of lessons learned and suggestions for possible improvement will be prepared and shared with key stakeholders currently implementing a MP exercise or planning to do so.

Government representatives will become more familiar with the Migration Profile concept and will be able to assess if there is a need and interest by their national government in producing a Migration Profile for their country in the near future.

Meeting Format

The briefing is structured as a face to face event, benefiting from the contribution of renowned experts from governments, the Global Migration Group, civil society and academia. The workshop would help governments involved in a Migration Profile exercise to share their experience with others. Following the presentations, participants will have the opportunity to engage in in-depth discussions with the speakers.

Target audience

The seminar is intended for the diplomatic community residing in New York with an interest in policy development and strategic planning. While the majority of the participants will be representatives from the diplomatic missions, the seminar remains open to other stakeholder such as other international agencies, civil society, academia, the private sector and other partners.
