

- Bilateral, corridor approach






Disrupting technologies

% of global GDP stored on Blockchain





Migration and Development Guidelines

In 2019 AICS started an internal consultation on M&D approach, starting from the analysis of the current programmes implemented in Africa, most of them oriented on the so called "root causes approach".

We are involving the different constituencies (Institutions, International Organizations, CSOs, PS, Academia) of the National Council for Development Cooperation to define M&D guidelines focusing on:

- new approaches beyond "root causes"
- mainstreaming migration in drafting new AICS activities
- strengthening engagement of the migrants communities living in Italy
